## From the First Selectman's Desk March Highlights and April Updates

Dear Bethany Residents,
When the March Bulletin went to print in February, we had not reached the extra day to celebrate Leap Year. That 366th day is added to keep the calendar year synchronized with the astronomical year or seasonal year. It takes ap-
 proximately 365.25 days for Earth to orbit the Sun - a solar year. We usually round the days in a calendar year to 365 . To make up for the missing partial day we add one day to our calendar approximately every four years.
Did you know? Some Fun Facts about Leap Year:

- 4 million people in the world are leap day babies.
- Leap day babies are called leapers or leaplings.
- There is a one in 1,461 chance of being a leap day baby.
- Every year divisible by 4 is a leap year.
- But every year divisible by 100 is NOT a leap year.

As we have experienced over that past few months, Mother Nature continues to be fickle. March came in with not much of a roar but lots of chances for rain. As the saying goes: "At least we didn't have to shovel it." March could just not make up its mind what season it wanted to be even with Spring starting on the 19th. According to the calendar Spring has now officially sprung, and we can hopefully look forward to more beautiful, consistent weather ahead.

If you travel Amity Road regularly, you may have noticed catch basins being replaced at various locations along Amity Road both north and south of the Bethany/Woodbridge town line. The State is getting things set up to start the process of repaving Amity Road. The project will start in Woodbridge and work its way north into Bethany going as far as Rte. 42 west (the south junction). The total miles covered in Bethany will be 3.98. They anticipate to start the milling process in Woodbridge around May 20th and ending June 11th depending on the weather. They have a tentative start date for paving around June 16th, ending July 10th, once again depending on the weather. All work will be done at night. Prior to and during the paving project, there may be a need to adjust drainage, curbing, signage, guide railing, pavement markings, and any other items that promote safe traveling conditions. I will keep you posted
as we receive more information.
Here are some highlights from the month of March for activities that were held early on:
Wednesday, March 6th, our Bethany seniors celebrated an early St. Patrick's Day at our Veterans Memorial Park Lakeview Lodge. Attendees were entertained with live music by Pierce Campbell, a member of Connecticut's own Irish Folk Band "The Kerry Boys." Approximately 75 meals were prepared by Mozaic of Bridgeport for inperson enjoyment or take-out. Always great food and wonderful service. A delicious meal of Guinness Beef Stew, a Shamrock salad (composed of assorted greens, dill, parsley, cucumber, green pepper and carrots) with a vinaigrette dressing, a tasty cupcake with Irish Cream frosting, as well as homemade Irish soda bread prepared by our very own Human Services Director, Robin Glowa, was served. As always, a BIG THANK YOU to Robin for organizing this event along with her assistant Emily. Thank you also to the volunteers who helped to make the event a success: Janice Howard, Trooper Ryan Piccirillo, Trooper Justin Trazski and Officer Dave.

On Friday, March 8th, Town Clerk Will Brinton, Registrar of Voters Jan Loomis and I attended a seminar entitled "2024 Election: It Will Be Different - Learn How and Be Prepared for Early Voting." This seminar was coordinated by the Connecticut Conference of Municipalities (CCM) and the Connecticut Association of Municipal Attorneys (CAMA). The speakers included Attorney Aida R. Carini, staff attorney for the Office of the Secretary of State, and Attorney Michael J. Brandi, Executive Director and General Counsel for the Elections Enforce-

ment Commission. Attorney Carini gave an overview of updates and how to look ahead with early voting. She fielded a variety of questions to try and help clarify issues that might arise. She shared her PowerPoint presentation with those present to have as a resource, which included additional contact information for any future questions. Attorney Brandi shared how his office works relating to voting and elections. There was much discussion about absentee ballots versus early voting. He also fielded a number of questions from those present. The seminar was full of helpful information and probably could have gone on for more than the two hours allotted.

We jumped ahead on Sunday, March 10th and gladly gained an extra hour of daylight. After some downpours during the night before, it turned out to be a cloudy day with a sprinkle here and there, and I had the pleasure again of marching in the St. Patrick's Day Parade in New Haven. The seasonable weather invited a good crowd to gather along the parade route. As you probably know, the parade covers a little over a mile starting on upper Chapel Street and proceeding down to the New Haven Green by New Haven City Hall. It is quite the experience and an honor to represent the Town of Bethany in the event. It's always fun to look for Bethany residents along the way, and I did see several, and got an occasional shout out.

Bethany Community School held an Invention Convention on Tuesday, March 12th in the school gym. It's like "Shark Tank meets Science Fair." Invention Convention competitions provide student innovators the opportunity to develop products that help solve a problem in their own lives or for those around them. Sometimes it takes more than one try to come up with the right solution. I had the honor to be a judge. There were approximately 23 aspiring inventors from Grades 3-5. There clearly was a lot of thought and work put into these projects. Besides me, staff and administrators also helped to judge the projects on originality of invention, purpose and practicality, attention to detail, adherence to the guidelines and presentation/display. Five semi-finalists were chosen to move on to the next level. The 41st Annual Connecticut Invention Convention State Finals will be held on Saturday, June 8, 2024, at the University of Connecticut Storrs Campus. Congratulations to all the inventors on a job well done. Thank you to Kimberly Wolcott, a teacher at BCS, for coordinating, organizing, and overseeing this event.

We have worked very hard to put together a budget that takes care of the needs of the Town and is fiscally responsible at the same time. The economic climate right now makes producing a budget quite a challenge. Just like running your house, some things are out of your control. We need to make sure that we are appropriately funding all departments to have them functioning at their best to serve the Town. At its March 12th meeting, the Board of Finance finalized its proposed budget to bring forward to the town residents.

You should have received the formal notice regarding the upcoming Public Hearing on the FY25 Town Budget. Date: Thursday, April 4, 2024 / Time: 7:00p.m.
/ Place: Bethany Community School Gymnasium. The purpose of the hearing is to have residents of Bethany get information on the proposed budget, ask questions and give feedback to the Board of Finance. This is the residents' opportunity to request increases or decreases in line items. The Board of Finance then makes any changes it agrees are necessary. The final version will then go to the Annual Town Meeting to be held on Monday, May 20th for approval. Applicable notification will be sent out to residents for this meeting.

We will continue to look for state and federal funding to help with any infrastructure projects to keep Bethany safe, vibrant and moving forward. As I have mentioned before, the grant process is a very laborious task. Every grant has different criteria and timelines. With many grants we may only have a short window in which to apply for the funding, but it could take several months before the project gets reviewed and approved, and then several more months before the funding actually gets appropriated and sent to the Town. Some grants are reimbursement grants where the Town has to expend the monies first, and then get reimbursed. There are annual grants as well as one-time grants, but we will watch to see which ones will be applicable to projects we need to help Bethany.

Make sure you take a look at the rest of the Bulletin for more information and fun activities going on in our beautiful little town. We may be small, but we rock it (3).

## It Happened In Bethany <br> Rose Hurst Dairy By Linda Wooster

Nancy Petruzzello Criscuolo has fond memories of her family's Rose Hurst Dairy which was located on Amity Road, almost across from the State Police Barracks. Nancy's mother, Marion, grew up on a farm in Middletown, CT. She was only 16 or 17 when Albert Petruzzello's father took him to the farm in Middletown to buy a cow. Albert was only 21 at the time. Marion happened to be in the barn when they arrived; Al must have thought that she was "pretty good looking" because they started dating. Marion could only go on a date with Al if her father was with them. She would sit in the front seat; the dad would sit in the backseat. It was a while before the couple could go out alone. It was a short courtship. They were married for 55 years.

When he started his own business, Albert Petruzzello worked for American Brass in Ansonia. His shift started at 4 PM and ended at midnight. He would leave at 12 AM and pick up milk from Borden's Dairy, go home to sleep for a few hours, and then make deliveries for his house routes. He started the business with one truck.
A short time after he left American Brass, A1 rented a building on Sorenson's Farm, Johnson Road in Woodbridge, where he had worked for several years. His two sons-in-law - George Valenti and Jimmie Nappi -- also worked at Rose Hurst. Saturdays were delivery and collection days. One brother-in-law had to work the morning of his wedding, because there was no one to cover for him. Albert‘s brother, Santo Petruzzello, ran Sound View Dairy on the Ansonia/Woodbridge line. He ran the farm until the airport bought the land.

Albert's cousin Mike Ferla would come to work at 11 PM to start bottling for the vending machines. At 2 AM the rest of the crew came in to bottle the glass containers for their own routes and for Sound View Dairy. Albert's younger brother, Michael Petruzzello, drove the trailer filled with bottled milk to Sound View Dairy. Obviously, the entire Rose Hurst Dairy operation was a family affair.

During its existence, the keys were never removed from Rose Hurst trucks parked out at the docks or in the yard. The dairy doors were open 24 hours a day.

Bob Criscuolo took over the milk machines during the last two years of the Rose Hurst operation. He filled them, fixed them, and maintained the trucks. At the end, Albert had seven trucks on the road, 50 vending machines, and made deliveries to eight diners. He had two tankers of raw milk delivered every day and distributed 1500-2000 cases of milk a day.
All the milk was pasteurized and homogenized. They used glass bottles for the house routes and paper containers for the stores and milk machines. Milk cost 25 cents a quart in the machine. The machines were filled 365 days a year. The price remained the same from 1959 to 1971.

Albert Petruzzello, a man with only a sixth-grade education, started and ran the successful Rose Hurst Dairy business for 13 years. Health issues forced him to give up the business he loved so much. In 1971, A1bert's nephew, Anthony Petruzzello bought the building, which is now Petruzzello's Transport on Amity Road. Guida Dairy bought the store and routes and Maple Shade Dairy bought the equipment.

## Sustainable Bethany

No. 40 Letter from Sustainable Bethany. Eclipse-April-8th, Book, Events.

Eclipse-April-8th: Those planning to travel to see the total solar eclipse (April 8) might be lucky enough to experience something extraordinary! We are approaching the height of the 11-year solar cycle characterized by spectacular solar flares. Late February saw powerful top-tier solar flares launch off the Sun with more expected. These are bursts of radiation originating from sunspots. During total solar eclipses these flares erupt as tongues of flame. When a solar flare occurs, the radiation travels towards the Earth at the speed of light, ionizing our atmosphere and potentially causing radio blackouts. Accompanying coronal mass ejections can also cause havoc with radio and satellite transmissions. If you haven't made your eclipse travel plans yet, consider the weather. You are more likely to have clear weather in the Southwest over the Northeast. Now is the time to order solar eclipse glasses for safe viewing. You can obtain free ISO-certified solar eclipse glasses at the Warby Parker store in New Haven starting on April 1st as long as supplies last. From Bethany, at 3:27 PM, $91 \%$ of the Sun's disc will be covered by the Moon.

The Lyrid meteor shower is from April 16 to April 25, peaking around April 22. Seen from Bethany, the shower will not be visible before 8:22 PM when its radiant point rises above our eastern horizon. It will remain active until dawn around 5:29 AM.

## Bethany Trivia [courtesy of the Historical Society]

According to Bethany news reporter Barrie Collins:

1. At least nine former Bethany residents became president of a college, including Barnard, Quinnipiac, Radcliffe, Smith, Sweet Briar and Warren Wilson.
2. George Durrie, the most famous Currier and Ives artist, married a Bethany woman, Sarah Perkins, in Bethany's Christ Episcopal Church. Three of his paintings are owned by the White House. One, believed to be of the local church, was used on a Christmas card by President Gerald Ford.
3. At least five US postage stamps were designed by Bethany residents Alvin Eisenman and John Hill.
4. A Bethany newspaper, "the Amity Star," was edited by George Vaill, a former resident and owner of the Bethany Press from 1950 to 1953.
5. Tolls were once charged on the Litchfield Turnpike, while Amity Road was known as the Shunpike.
6. The state guide produced by writers in a national Depression-era project described Bethany as a "hamlet on the hilltop."
7. Wooden matches were manufactured at the Hoadley Mills in eastern Bethany.
8. A Yale Medical School monkey research farm was once planned on Bethway Road.

## From the Assessor's Office

Applications for tax credits for homeowners over 65 years of age and those totally disabled will be taken in the Assessor's office between 8:30 am and 4:00 pm beginning February 1, 2024, thru May 15, 2024.

## ELDERLY HOMEOWNERS \& DISABILITY PRO-

GRAM- This is a real estate tax credit program for homeowners who are at least 65 years of age as of December 31, 2023 and meet certain income guidelines. Those guidelines require that annual income for single people, including Social Security benefits, should not exceed $\$ 43,800$. Married couples can be eligible if their income, including Social Security benefits, does not exceed $\$ 53,400$. Applicants should bring all proof of their 2023 income including a copy of their 2023 Income Tax Return, if filing, and proof of Social Security income (Form 1099). Also, applicant must own and reside at the property for which tax relief is sought or must hold tenancy for life use of the property and be liable for the tax bill. This must be the applicant's principal or legal residence.
Those Homeowners who are disabled, and don't qualify for the elderly homeowner's program because they are under the age of 65 can apply. One must provide proof of their disability award letter from the Social Security Administration. Also, the same income guidelines must be met.
Previous participants in either of these two programs will be required to re-file their applications bi-annually and will be notified by mail of this refiling requirement. New applicants who think they qualify for this tax relief should inquire at the Assessor's Office. In addition to this State property tax relief program, the Town of Bethany has adopted a local option property tax relief program at the February 7, 2000, Special Town Meeting. Those applicants who qualify for the State of Connecticut property tax relief program will also receive the Town of Bethany benefit. Those taxpayers who are already on the program and are required to refile, will be notified by mail.

[^2]is $\$ 68,800$ for single applicants and $\$ 78,400$. Income includes adjusted gross income plus any other income, including Social Security benefits. Income is based upon the 2023 calendar year. Federal Income Tax return and/or proof of all income must be presented to the Assessor's office which is open Monday through Friday 8:30 am and 4:00 pm. Please remember that all proof of income, including Social Security benefits (Form SSA-1099) for the 2023 calendar year must be submitted by September 30, 2024, or the application cannot be processed.

Proof of 2023 income and social security earnings (SSA-1099) is REQUIRED ALONG WITH RECEIPTS OF ALL 2023 RENT AND 2023 UTILITIES (exclusive of phone \& cable).
Those persons who had applied for this program last year will be mailed an application in April 2024.

We'll also learn to recognize and address the presence of invasive plants that threaten this delicate ecosystem balance.
