## BETHANY LAND TRUST

### November Evening Hike in Van Epps Preserve - Wowed by a Barred Owl

Walking moonlit trails in the Van Epps Preserve on a cool November evening, hikers were joined by a barred owl. Some 30 adults and kids joined the Land Trust's final hike of 2025. Responding to calls projected from audio files played on a Bluetooth speaker, the owl landed in a nearby tree about 15 feet above the hikers, perching for some time before flying off into the forest. Calls of screech owls and great horned owls were played but no contact was made.

A round-headed owl with dark eyes and no "ear" tufts, barred owls are about 20 inches in length with a wingspan of about 3 feet. Its hooting call, "Who cooks for you? Who cooks for you-all?" is a classic sound of old forests. They are largely native to eastern North America. While mature forests are their preferred habitat, they can also acclimatize to various gradients of open woodlands.

In addition to seeing the owl, hikers heard poems included in the Van Epps portion of the Poetry Trail, walked up to Spirit Rock perched above a ravine in the preserve, and enjoyed cider and macaroons warming before a bonfire. It was a magical walk in the woods in the moonlight.

### Fall Program: Indigenous Ceremonial Stone Structures in Connecticut - Oct. 16th, 7 PM

On Thursday, October 16th at Veteran's Memorial Lodge, Jim Powers, Connecticut author and historian, gave a presentation to a crowd of nearly 60 people about indigenous ceremonial stone structures that can be found here in southern Connecticut. Mr. Powers shared a collection of photographs as well as spoke to the importance of a variety of stone structures built and celebrated by native peoples for spiritual and astronomical purposes.

## **Sustainable Bethany**

No. 60. Letter from Sustainable Bethany.

Holiday wrapping: The EPA writes, "As we feast, give gifts, decorate and travel during the holiday season, we also consume lots of resources and generate lots of waste. The amount of household garbage in the United States can increase by 25% between Thanksgiving and New Year's Day, from 4 million to 5 million tons." Consider zero-waste alternatives; reuse wrapping paper, brown paper decorated with pinecones/conifer foliage/stamps/or paint, Furoshiki wrapping, fabric dish cloths, sheet music, newspapers, Sunday cartoons, wallpaper remnants, all tied together with natural twine/ribbons. Note: Gift wrap is not acceptable at our Recycle Center.

**Recommended reading:** Peter Wohlleben's book The Hidden Life of Trees (2015), was both commended/criticized for anthropomorphizing our forests. Trees communicate through their roots, trunks, branches, leaves, nuts and pollens. It is the result of millions of years in evolution, as trees interact with the environment. When insects attack one tree, chemicals released "warn" neighboring trees. Synergistic relationships between insects and trees ensure survival of the trees, while allowing insects to thrive and propagate. Two takeaways. When walking through our woods, realize what an amazing ecosystem surrounds you. However, it took millions of vears to evolve this ecosystem, and climate-change threatens to upend it, as trees take longer to adapt to environmental changes.

**December night-skies:** On crisp December evenings step outside and look up at night sky sights.

Geminid meteor shower (December 13th-14th): very active shower with soaring meteors radiating from the constellation Gemini. Dozens of meteors/hour seen a few hours after sunset through the night. For perfect enjoyment lie on a lounge chair with a warm blanket, hot chocolate, and look skyward. No other equipment is needed.

Planets and Constellations: Jupiter is easy to spot. Look for a bright "star-like" object rising in the east after sunset; with effort Saturn is visible, though lower in the sky; Uranus and Neptune will require binoculars or a clear dark sky. As nights lengthen, winter

constellations dominate the sky. The star cluster Pleiades and bright stars pop up early.

**December Supermoon:** Supermoon, December 4th.

**December 21st (winter solstice):** the northern hemisphere shortest day, when the Sun's annual journey through the zodiac constellations reaches its most southerly point in the constellation Capricornus (declination of 23.5°S). It's the first day of winter.

# It Happened in Bethany From Audioarts Engineering to Wheatstone Corporation By Linda Wooster

From an early age, Gary Snow's passion for electronics was apparent. By age 12 Gary was repairing radios and TVs in his neighborhood and by 15 he was building his own stereo systems, guitar amplifiers, and loudspeaker enclosures. In 1974, Gary and his wife founded Audioarts Engineering in the attic of their one-bedroom home in rural Bethany with just \$400 in cash to their name.

Their first product was born from the disco boom of the 1970s -- a simple mixer dubbed the "5200 Disco Mixer," designed for nightclub use. As demand grew, Audioarts expanded its line. In 1976, the Snows released a parametric equalizer, a feedback suppressor, and an electronic crossover, all hand-built in that attic workshop.

By 1977, the Snows' operation had grown enough to exhibit at the AES (Audio Engineering Society) show in New York City. The next year, in 1978, they unveiled their first larger multi-channel sound reinforcement console — a sign that their ambitions were expanding beyond small mixers.

As business flourished, the tiny attic could no longer contain their operations. Gary and Kathy moved Audioarts into a converted old carriage house/horse stable nearby — a building they called the "Gray Barn," located on Downs Road. Hiring assembly workers allowed them to produce larger mixing consoles and outboard processing gear.

In 1981, the company formally incorporated as Wheatstone Corporation, named after their ambitious "Wheatstone Project" — a high-end custom sound reinforcement console (LM-80) developed in Bethany. That same year, they acquired a 5,000-square-foot building in Bethany, establishing their first real home base.

During their years in Bethany, Audioarts built a reputation for quality. From the outset in Bethany, Audioarts positioned itself slightly differently from some of the large broadcast manufacturers of the time. Rather than chasing complex feature sets, the company focused on clean audio paths, intuitive layouts, and modules that could be replaced easily—a significant advantage for local radio stations, which often lacked in-house technical staff. This philosophy quickly found an audience among small- and mid-market broadcasters seeking reliability without excessive specialization.

Wheatstone consoles and processors earned praise for low noise, low distortion, and solid build. By 1984, they sold their first broadcast radio console (to WGBH in Boston), signaling a strategic shift toward the broadcast market. Even as networking technologies reshaped the broadcast landscape, Wheatstone models maintained their reputation as "workhorse" consoles—tools built for the real-world pressures of live radio.

From those modest beginnings in Bethany — attic to Gray Barn to factory — Audioarts (later Wheatstone) grew into a respected designer and manufacturer of professional audio consoles, signal processing gear, and broadcast equipment.

### From the desk of the Fire Marshal

As we all know, winter can be brutal. Snow and ice can accumulate on power lines, the wind blows, and power goes out. This means it is time to break out the generators and alternative heat sources like propane heaters.

Recently in a neighboring town, carbon monoxide from an alternative heat source sent seven people to the hospital with serious carbon monoxide poisoning. Please use caution and read all the directions from the manufacturer. Even though the box may state for indoor use, it most likely is not. You should also install Carbon monoxide detectors on every level of your home. Especially outside your sleeping areas.

Carbon monoxide is an odorless, tasteless, and colorless gas. It is known as the silent killer. Symptoms of Carbon monoxide poisoning are headache, dizziness, weakness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion. If you have any questions, please contact me (203) 393-2100 Extension 1119.

# From the Department of Public Works Winter Reminders

### Don Shea, Public Works Manager

- Snowplows may push snow in front of residential driveways. It is the homeowner's responsibility to clear access to their driveway. Do not shovel or snow blow snow from the driveway into the road.
- The Town will repair or replace mailboxes and/or posts that are struck by a plow blade, not ones damaged by the force of plowed snow. Plastic posts and mailboxes may not withstand the force of the snow. A recommendation is a 4-inch by 4-inch wooden post or 2-inch metal pipe, with a metal mailbox.
- Private plow contractors cannot push snow from private driveways or parking lots into the street. If there is no option but to put the snow in the street, the private plow must re-plow that part of the road until it is clear. Do not pull cars into the road and clear snow off of them in the road.
- No vehicles should be parked on the road during a snowstorm. Snow stakes can be installed along the edge of a property to help distinguish the property from the pavement. The stakes should be 30-36 inches high. Wooden stakes should have the top three (3) inches painted red to increase visibility.
- -As the winter season approaches, you may see Public Works going out and putting up what appear to be random stakes around town. Please know that they serve a purpose and will be removed when the winter season ends.
- Do not place garbage pails/bins in the road. They should be kept in your driveway.
- DPW will be doing brush work along the road for any overhanging brush.


