Reminders: The Public Works Department has been going through Town putting in stakes at various locations. Those stakes are temporary for the winter season and will be removed in the spring. The stakes help the Public Works crew when plowing.

As we still have some winter to contend with: Here are some additional reminders from the Public Works Department – Snow plowing reminders/rules:

-Blocked driveways – Snowplows may push snow in front of residential driveways. It is the homeowner's responsibility to clear access to their driveway. To avoid repeatedly clearing, it is recommended to wait until the plow is done.

-Mailbox damage – The Town will repair or replace mailboxes and/or posts that are struck by a plow blade, not ones damaged by the force of plowed snow. Plastic posts and mailboxes may not withstand the force of the snow. A recommendation is a 4-inch by 4-inch wooden post or 2-inch metal pipe, with a metal mailbox.

-Private plowing – Private plow contractors cannot push snow from private driveways or parking lots into the street. If there is no option but to put the snow in the street, the private plow must re-plow that part of the road until it is clear.

-Parking – No vehicles should be parked on the road during the winter months. This impedes the plow trucks from properly clearing the roads during inclement weather events.

-Snow stakes – Snow stakes can be installed along the edge of your property to help distinguish the property from the pavement. The stakes should be 30-36 inches high. Wooden stakes should have the top three (3) inches painted red to increase visibility.

-Any questions or concerns should be directed to the Public Works Department – 475-238-6966.

An important reminder from the Bethany Volunteer Fire Department: In an emergency, every second counts. Help first responders by making sure you have your address number properly displayed on both your mailbox and house. Numbers on the house should be at least four (4") inches tall; numbers on the mailbox should be at least three (3") inches tall and reflective; if it is a shared driveway with clustered mailboxes, use arrows to distinguish each address; and be sure that any tall plants or shrubbery, or snow, around the mailbox does not block the visibility of the numbers. Driveways should have clear access. Help them in order to help you if an emergency occurs.

These reminders above also help when fuel is being delivered. Residences should be properly identified, and driveways and delivery pipes should be easily and safely accessible. Preventative measures are always key to divert problems.

The winter season is officially upon us! Please be sure you are prepared for any inclement weather. If you have not done so already, please sign up for Code Red on the Town website: Easy to do: Go to the Town main page, scroll down, click on Sign Up for Emergency Phone Alerts and just follow the directions from there. Many people have dropped their landlines in favor of using their cell phones. You will have the option of receiving texts and/or emails. If you are already on the Code Red system, please make sure your information is up to date.

As we know, Bethany weather conditions can change in an instant and can be very different from our neighboring towns. Our roads are a pleasure to drive on, but safety is always a main concern and keeping a slow speed is very important for maintaining control. When snow hits, please keep in mind that our Town crew works very hard to keep our roads clear for travel. We have over 60+ miles of road to cover, and we do our best to take care of them in a timely fashion. Conditions may warrant allowing additional time for travel or waiting until they improve. Please take your time—for your safety and the safety of others.

Please make sure you read the full reminder notice from the Tax Collector's Office: The second installment of Bethany Real Estate and Personal Property Taxes and the full amount of Supplemental Motor Vehicle Taxes become due and payable on January 1, 2025. Monday, February 3, 2025, is the last day to pay said taxes without interest penalty. Please see the Tax Collector's notice in this Bulletin for additional important information.

From the Fire Marshal's Desk

'Tis the Season: Not only is this the holiday season where we can enjoy ourselves with family and friends, but it is also the season for avoidable fire safety issues. The Fire Service responds to an increase in calls during the winter season for a variety of reasons. These include cooking and smoking-related fires in the home. These two everyday occurrences make up the number one and two causes for accidental fires, as well as fire-related deaths annually. Unattended cooking and improper use and disposal of smoking materials are the primary causes for these types of fires.

Another significant factor in cold-weather responses are carbon monoxide-related emergencies. This colorless and odorless gas is a by-product of combustion and is normally carried away via the appliances flue or chimney but can be expelled back into the home for a variety of reasons. These can include cracked or broken piping or masonry, service-related issues and more in fossil fuel and woodburning appliances. It is important to have these appliances serviced and inspected on a regular basis by a trained professional. At one time the Bethany Fire Department had responded to what appeared to be a routine medical call and because of a carbon monoxide meter attached to the medical bag, were alerted to a fatal level (over 500 Parts Per Million) of carbon monoxide and were able to rapidly remove the person from that environment. Awareness of potential problems and having early warning devices such as smoke and carbon monoxide detectors will help prevent these accidents.

Every home should have smoke detectors on every level, inside each bedroom, as well as outside the sleeping areas for proper coverage. Carbon monoxide detectors should also be placed on every level of the home. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) offers specific guidelines and a comprehensive amount of information and safety tips at their website. (www.nfpa.org). Please include these items on your list while you are out shopping. They may be the most important gift you can give. Cold Weather Hiking

Winter's cold, even with temps below freezing for several days, presents a unique

opportunity to leave our comfortable warm spaces indoors for a walk in the woods. No ticks, no mosquitoes, animal tracks, iced over streams and ponds, blissful quiet, early morning and late afternoon winter shadows, the unexpected warmth of the noonday sun, an altered perception of our favorite trails and places....the list of surprises goes on and on.

Being prepared is one secret to enjoying a winter walk in the woods. Check your local forecast and trail conditions. Dress in layers like an onion with a merino or smart wool/synthetic base layer. Use waterproof outer wear with room for layers underneath. It may be not so much bad weather as it is bad clothes. Start off cold, knowing you'll warm up and don't overdress. Pack some traction such as microspikes. Also, pack snacks and extra liquids; winter hiking is harder on your body, so you'll need extra fuel and drink more often than you think you should.

Recommendations for safe outdoor recreation are also available from the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) and the Connecticut Forest and Park Association (CFPA) posted on their websites.

Educational Program Addendum: Monarch Butterflies Recommended for Protected Status

Last May at the Land Trust's spring educational program, Kelsey Fisher, Ph.D, entomologist with the Connecticut Agricultural Experimental Station, presented a detailed overview of the monarch butterfly life cycle. She described how habitat loss, pesticide use and climate change have significantly reduced monarch populations.

In December, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service proposed protection for the monarch butterfly and is encouraging the public to be part of its recovery. The Service is seeking public input on a proposal to list the species as threatened with species-specific protections and flexibilities to encourage conservation under section 4(d) of the Endangered Species Act (ESA). It Happened In Bethany How It Started... The Bethany Historical Society By Linda Wooster

Longtime Bethany, friends, Bob and Jan Brinton, Hiram Carrington, Edith Carrington, Timer and Kathryn Downs met at the Brinton house and began discussing what to do with the "treasures" in the Brinton attic. Bob, an avid historian, had collected items of interest from around Bethany for many years.

The group decided that they would need some type of "historical society," similar to those of surrounding towns, in order to receive donated items. The Society started without any thought of where to store their treasures. They hoped to acquire a room at the school or some type of storage facility. At the time, it seemed that every house in Bethany had something "historical" that needed saving. The group asked Attorney Jerry Barnett to help establish a local foundation, which became known as the Bethany Historical Society.

The group spread the word about wanting items of historical interest to create the museum. After several more get-togethers, Society members started looking for a place to store those items. Recollections are vague as to how the church, town, and newlyformed Historical Society entered into conversations to consider the Stanley H. Downs Old Town Hall on Amity Road as a museum — a repository for historic Bethany items being collected. That building was owned by the Episcopal Church, had been used by various groups and agencies for several years, but was currently vacant and in need in of major repairs. The church had originally bought the old Town Hall because they needed the parking spaces for parishioners. If they hadn't bought it, whoever did could turn the area into a residence, dig up the back parking lot, and eliminate all church parking in that area. The church had not maintained the building, and it was in a state of disrepair.

In 1994, the church turned the building over to the Historical Society in return for the town forgiving the balance of the sale price. Society members had to go to a town meeting to get approval for the remaining balance of the church purchase price to be forgiven by the Town.

And thus, the Historical Society had a place to store its growing number of historic Bethany items. Bob Brinton and several others began the arduous process of cataloguing the documents and artifacts as he and other Society members made extensive repairs and renovations to the building. Timer Downs was elected the first president... followed by Will Brinton for a year, and Les Warner for the next 12 years. Linda Wooster was elected president in 2021.

In helping people clean out their houses of historical items, Timer Downs was working with the Russell family on Round Hill Road. One evening Kathryn and Timer were invited to the Russell home for coffee. Unbeknown to them, Ernie and Mary Russell had been discussing donating the house, barn, and land located next to their house, to the Historical Society. Soon after that, on Christmas Eve, Timer and Ernie met at the attorney's office, and the Society bought the Russell Homestead for one dollar.

The Homestead, and especially the barn, was in need of major structural repairs. An army of volunteers, led by Les Warner, spent thousands of hours repairing and cleaning the buildings in order to preserve a glimpse of life in agricultural Bethany for future generations.

2023-24 proved to be an epic year for the Historical Society as the town designated a portion of the Federal ARPA funds for non-profit organizations. That once-in-a-lifetime funding opportunity, along with support from local businesses and private donors, resulted in a new roof, exterior painting, air conditioning, carpeting, a repaved parking lot and driveway, new septic system, masonry repairs, supplies for Homestead repairs, and monies to begin digitizing our amazing artifacts so they may be shared online.

The generosity of voters and the Best Bakers in Bethany resulted in a record-setting Election Day Bake Sale. Volunteers brought their backhoes to work magic on the Russell Homestead fields. In addition, BHS plans to launch its new website at Bethanyhistory.com. Check us out!

No. 49. Letter from Sustainable Bethany, Surviving Falling Through Ice, Well Water Testing, Book, January Night Skies, Upcoming Events.

Surviving falling through ice: Rule 1: Don't go out on thin ice. But if you do and fall through, then follow the 1-10-1 principle. **Minute 1**, stop drowning; **10 minutes** self-rescue; **1 hour**, warming.

Minute 1. During the fall stick out your arms to prevent your head from going under water. You'll experience an immediate "cold shock response," gasping, hard breathing, and panic. This lasts 1-3 minutes. Focus on slowing breathing and keeping head above water. Stay still, calm down.

10 Minutes. Exit towards the ice you were on. It held your weight before the fall. Reach forward with arms and raise legs to a swimming position. Kick vigorously pulling with arms and elbows scooching chest and abdomen up onto ice. Once on the ice, roll away. Flatten yourself to spread your body weight and either slide, army crawl, or roll to safety. If you can't get out allow arms to freeze to ice. If you blackout, this will safely hold you until help arrives.

1 hour. Regaining warmth. ASAP remove everything that's wet. Wrap in dry fabric and apply warm compresses to neck, chest wall and groin, not arms and legs. Do not warm legs and arms first. This forces cold blood back to the heart and lungs dropping core temperature further, which could be fatal. Do not use direct heat e.g., heat lamp/heating pad/ hot water on numb skin. Drink warm fluids.

Safety ice picks and whistle. If you plan to be on or near ice, buy safety wearable ice picks with retractable cord for grip and an emergency whistle. Next issue, tips on saving your dog.

Well Water Testing: On November 16th UCONN's mobile water lab visited town. 80 households participated. Of the samples tested, there were a significant number of samples that exceeded state safety minimums. Among the finding were that more than 1 in 5 samples exceeded state minimums for TCB colonies (an indicator of Vibrio contamination) and 2 samples tested positive for E. coli contamination. If you haven't had your well tested recently, we recommend that you do so. We are currently planning a program on water testing and remediation. Watch this space for details. Our thanks to Marie Pulito and Sheila Wade for organizing the well water testing program.

Book: Solvable: *How we healed the Earth, and how we can do it again,* by Susan Solomon

We have faced planet threatening problems before and have solved them. Solomon describes how we addressed past environmental issues over the health of our environment, and how we came together to solve them. She focusses on issues of the growing Antarctic ozone hole, overwhelming smog in Los Angeles, ubiquity of lead in everything from paint, gasoline to water pipes, and the scourge of DDT. We now turn our attention to climate change, and as in the past, there is an avenue to solve environmental problems when they become personal and perceptible to the public. Decision makers respond to this momentum, and effective change takes place when legislation and regulation lead to practical solutions.

January Night Skies: The Quadrantid meteor shower is active December 12-January 12, producing its peak rate of meteors around January 3 (time of new moon). From Bethany the radiant point is circumpolar, above the horizon, and active throughout the night. 114 meteors/hour are expected at its peak.

Now is the time of year to visit the constellation Orion, named after a Greek mythological hunter and is one of the most prominent constellations in the northern hemisphere. One of 88 modern constellations, it was among 48 constellations listed by the 2nd-century Greco-Egyptian astronomer Ptolemy. Orion's two brightest stars, Rigel and Betelgeuse (Yes, that is the source of the movie character Beetlejuice's name!), are among the brightest stars and are supergiants. To find Orion look for his belt, three bright stars close together in an almost-straight line. Two brighter stars to the north represent his shoulders and two more to the south represent his feet. Orion also hosts the radiant of the annual Orionids meteor shower associated with Halley's Comet, and the Orion Nebula, one of the brightest nebulae in the sky, and middle "star" of three making up Orion's sword. The nebula is a great cloud of gas and dust, a nursery for newborn stars.

Since the theme of this month's Sustainable Bethany column is water, astrophysicists have found water on many orbs in our solar system, including some of the planets, dwarf planets, their moons. Water is present on Mars, Pluto, Uranus; the Jupiter moons named Europa and Ganymede; and Saturn's moon, Titan.

All payments remaining unpaid after February 3,2024 will be charged interest from January 1, 2025, at the rate of 1.5% for each month elapsing from the due date of the delinquent tax to the date of payment with a minimum interest charge of \$2.00 per installment. SS 12-146 Failure to receive a tax bill does not relieve the taxpayer of his/her responsibility for the payment of taxes or delinquent charges. SS 12-130

Payments may also be made at the Tax Collector's Office M-F 8:30 to 4:00, or online at www.bethanyct.com. Supply a self-addressed stamped envelope if you require a receipt mailed back to you. Credit Card payments will require a 2.5% bank fee to be paid by the taxpayer. There is no fee for EFT payments online.
